The eponymous "Paper Bag Principle" refers to a practice wherein if you wanted admittance to an elite event, a paper bag was held up to your skin. If you were darker than the bag, you could not come in. The test mostly existed as an urban myth, though Dr. Kerr found people who claimed they were actually subjected to the test.

Many churches, fraternities, and nightclubs used the "brown paper bag" principle as a test for entrance. People at these organizations would take a brown paper bag and hold it against a person's skin. If a person was lighter than the bag, they were admitted. People whose skin was not lighter than a brown paper bag were denied entry.
